

While increased wage and material costs, on account of N.R.A. compliance, and tremendously increased taxes have more than eaten up the increased earnings we have attained, the prospect for the future is just enough better to allow the Company to risk restoring a part of the cuts made in 1932. There's a lot of faith in this move—first, faith in the territory in which we operate and in its ability to recover, and second, faith in the individual employee and his enthusiasm to carry the Company forward as the opportunities arise. Let us hope that our faith in these matters is justified.

As of September 1, all employees who have had two tenper-cent cuts in base pay will have the August, 1932 cut restored. In those few cases where total cuts have been less than two ten-per-cents, one half of the total cuts will be restored, and for those employees whose base pay has been adjusted on account of changes in hours required by the N.R.A., equitable adjustments will be made.
